There are local families with three generations of runners who have competed – parents, children, and now the grandchildren of those who first stepped up to the start line half a century ago. On Memorial Day, Monday, May 27, the 10 K race begins 7:30 AM in front of the University City Public Library (6701 Delmar), with the 5 K starting at 7:50 AM. LIBRARY GARDEN PLANS INCLUDE BEAUTY IN THE SHADE AND VEGGIES IN THE SUN

This spring you will be able to watch the transformation of both the secret garden on the University City Public Library's west side, and the parking lot beds to the north as our horticulturalist Jesse Gilbertson's plans are implemented by U City in Bloom staff and volunteers. In the secret garden, trees and shrubs will be planted first with a lovely selection of woodland perennials to follow. The trees will set the structure of this intimate space and will be positioned to add a little mystery for anyone walking the path and to provide a pretty view for anyone sitting on one of the benches. We just learned that this garden would connect to a new educational space that the library's youth services is planning.


The Library will build and grow vegetables in raised beds to introduce children to gardening and learn where their food comes from. Jesse plans to work closely with the Library staff so these spaces seamlessly transition and add to the beauty of the grounds. Look for additional renovations to the Delmar side and east side of the library to follow in 2025.

REPORT FROM THE WOODS

If you are driving or walking on McKnight near Olive Boulevard you will notice big changes at the Ruth Woods trailhead. No longer are there rank after rank of bush honeysuckle clumps standing shoulder to shoulder preventing any sort of access of sun or breeze or living space for native tree and shrub seedlings and perennials. No longer does wintercreeper drape down from the trees smothering bark and plants and dropping seed to reinforce its efforts to dominate the forest floor in partnership with the honeysuckle. No longer does it look like a dark foreboding jungle one would hesitate to enter. We are gaining our woods back and if you hadn't noticed, I can sure tell you the plants and birds and insects and animals have noticed.

As you look a little closer you might also notice a new footpath that starts near where the edge of the woods meets the golf course. After a year of clearing the area this past year it has become a favorite part of the project for me, and I decided we should share it with a new path. Many wonderful old trees live along this path and it's a favorite haunt of our local Barred Owl. With changes of grade and meandering turns it offers a fresh perspective into and out of the woods. Eventually you will join up with another little trail and you can go either left or right and find yourself taken to the main gravel trail.

where all the action is. This is a transitional space where you will find the most diversity of plants that can tolerate sun and shade and with that you get a greater numbers and diversity of insects that birds feed on, not to mention a diversity of seed for them to eat. Rodents like that seed too and if they aren't careful and you are lucky enough to be watching, you just might see them enter the food chain with the help of a diving hawk.

I could go on and on about what our community gains from this work. Within these trees is a place to reflect, to be inspired. It promotes physical activity and provides a connection with nature in our urban environment where it reduces city noise and moderates heat. A great sense of pride and community is found in green places, especially when those places are cared for. Our own community of volunteers that do the work is incredible and positive. This is where I shamelessly ask you to consider volunteering. The benefits of the woods are many and we see it as a noble endeavor to help bring them back to health for local ecology and our community to share.

RUTH WOODS GETS NEW MARKER BENCH

What a wonderful gift! After three plus years of hard work clearing Ruth Park Woods, fittingly, the much-improved forest has a new entrance marker at the McKnight Trailhead. And it's a bench too! The same artisan who carved the weathered old sign, Allen (Al) Hopkins (in blue), created the bench for the Woods. Al has worked for the City since 1995 as a tree trimmer in the Forestry Division, and currently is the crew leader. He does chainsaw carvings in his free time. The log he used is from a City street tree that was removed by the Forestry crew. He said that he wanted to make something to replace the old sign that was unique as well as practical. Be sure to notice the charming little nature designs carved around the border.

UNIVERSITY CITY LIBRARY'S GARDENS ARE A BIG PROJECT

When the University City Public Library opened in 1969, the landscaping consisted of some hawthorn trees on the east and west sides, a few old sycamores, and a line of barberry bushes along the parking lot. These bushes, whose thorns caught every bit of blowing paper that escaped Delmar-Harvard students' hands, were soon replaced by Bradford pear trees, an even less desirable species as time would tell. In the early 1990s, U City in Bloom tried to add more interest to the area by installing (perhaps without the full knowledge of the Library...) a raised bed bordered by the then-popular railroad ties at the southeast corner. It included a big "U C" outlined by small bushy plants. These proved to be an inviting nesting place for a mother mallard duck. She eventually led her growing ducklings off in search of water, which resulted in the Library staff's very own "Make Way for Ducklings" moment.

When Linda Ballard became Library Director in 1993, one of her first meetings was with UCB's Mary Ann Shaw to discuss how to make the Library grounds more attractive. The Friends of the Library raised money to fund the original installation by U City in Bloom, an azalea garden with shade plants, along the parking lot side. Next, understory plants were added on the east side, then Linda Wiggins- Kraft was commissioned to prepare a plan for the front of the building on Delmar. Finally, a charming hidden garden was planted on the west side outside the Library's workroom. Staff members enjoy breaks and lunch hours out on the benches.




Horticulturalist Jesse Gilbertson's plans take shape in the west side garden




Five years ago, taxpayers approved a complete renovation of the Library building. Now open after major setbacks during construction, it is handsome and inviting inside, but the UCB gardens need replacing after construction, sewer excavation, tree removal, and no water availability severely damaged most areas. Worst of all, a major water main break in February 2023 flooded out the west side garden and filled the library basement with 160,000 gallons of water, destroying completed buillding work. books, stored furniture, and the elevator.

Our horticulturalist Jesse Gilbertson has big plans to redo all of the gardens. Already the former muddy hole from the water main break has been levelled, mulched, and a beautiful new flagstone path installed. The front garden is largely removed, returning briefly to what it looked like before our gardeners began working there so long ago.
